Interviews

Austin, Eunice. "H-0316." Interview by Jacquelyn Dowd Hall. University of North Carolina Oral Histories of the American South. August 18, 1979. Accessed January 29, 2014.

This interview taught me about the blacklisting of several workers after their open participation in the strike. The interviewee was a striking rayon girl in 1929. She saw first-hand how the Bemberg and Glanzstoff plant managers blacklisted some of the women following the strike settlement.

Daisy Bates was the president of the Arkansas NAACP and the one who met and listened to the students each day. This firsthand account was very important to my paper because it made me more aware of the feelings of people involved.

"Bibliography" is typed and centered on the first line of the first page of the bibliography

Bibliography is separated into primary and secondary sources.

TIP: Further categorize the sources into interviews, periodicals, video, photographs, books etc.

Annotations explain how you used the source and how it helped you to understand your topic better. Annotations are NOT a summary of each source.

It is properly paginated

All sources that contributed to the development of your paper, provided usable information, or afforded new perspectives appear in the bibliography.

If a source is ambiguous in nature, you need to justify in your annotations why you listed it as a primary or secondary source. It should NOT be listed under both categories.
